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## A Note from the President

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In the past year, the list of activities of the Audubon Chapter of Minneapolis is a long one, but accomplishments are harder to measure. Only the lasting impact on members and on the citizens of the community is ultimately of value. To that end, I believe that the quality of our efforts was good and will affect the environment for the long-term benefit of the Twin City area.

In March about seven members spent a day talking to legislators about such issues as off-highway vehicles, environmental support, and preserving the Ecological Services Division of the DNR. This annual event may be an opportunity for other members to speak out on important issues. If interested, contact Jerry Bahls.

At Audubon Park in North Minneapolis, a joint effort with the Audubon Neighborhood Association resulted in an Environmental Fair for local residents to be more aware of birds and habitat. Boy Scouts provided help to people to make bird feeders, while Audubon supplied seed and provided t-shirts of the event. Approximately 200 people took part in activities such as bird-watching trips in the park.

ACM joined the Friends of Eloise Butler Wildflower Garden and Bird Sanctuary to rid the area of exotic plants such as buckthorn and garlic mustard. ACM provided equipment, bags, hoes, and aprons for about ten volunteers to spend the day improving the native ecosystem.

ACM has spawned the Bluebird Recovery Program and the Redheaded Woodpecker Recovery Program which grow in numbers of volunteers and impact each year. We have had information tables at Living Green Expo, Minnesota Green, and Wild Ones Expo.

Kit Healy has spearheaded an effort use the Minneapolis Adopt-a-Park program to continue the ongoing purge of exotic species in Roberts Bird Sanctuary. RBS is part of a recently designated Important Bird Area in the Minneapolis Chain of Lakes. Kit has worked with the Minneapolis Park Board to come up with a plan and apply for a funding grant to restore this sanctuary to its historically prime state.

Marji Miller has acted as program chair this year to provide a series of great speakers at the monthly program at Mayflower Church. Susan Anderson as membership chair has actively promoted member involvement, and we have seen an increase in attendance to 45-50 people at our recent programs.

Author of *Birds of Minnesota*, *Captivating Bluebirds*, and many more

Naturalist, wildlife photographer, and writer Stan Tekiela is the originator of the popular state-specific field guides such as *Birds of (state name) Field Guide*, *Wildflowers of (state name)*, and *Trees of (state name)*. Over the past two decades, Stan has authored more than 100 field guides, nature appreciation books and wildlife audio CDs for nearly every state in the nation, presenting many species of birds, mammals, reptiles and amphibians, trees, wildflowers and cacti.

Holding a Bachelor of Science degree in Natural History from the University of Minnesota and as an active professional naturalist for more than 20 years, Stan studies and photographs wildlife throughout the United States and has received various national and regional awards for his books and photographs.

Also a well-known columnist and radio personality, his syndicated column appears in over 20 newspapers and his wildlife programs are broadcast on a number of Midwest radio stations. He is a member of the North American Nature Photography Association and Canon Professional Services along with many other professional organizations.

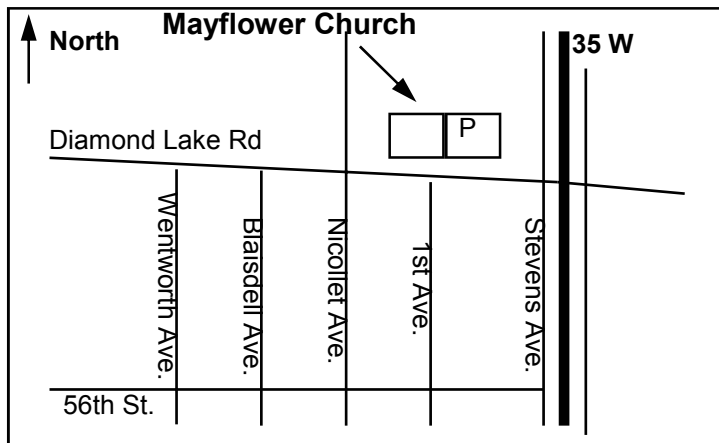

John Arthur, Susan Tertell, Jerry Bahls, Susan Anderson, and others have initiated our new website at [audubonchapterofminneapolis.org](http://audubonchapterofminneapolis.org). It has seen an increasing number of contacts as people (and local TV stations) begin to rely on it for chapter information. In our goal as an education organization, we have seen the following in the past year:

- Audubon Adventures kits actively used in nine elementary schools (parents and teachers: are your schools making use of this valuable resource?)
- Adopted Harvest/Seed Academy in North Minneapolis to provide field trips and birding resources to the fifth grade. Members also donated many types of field guides for the classes. We were given a grant to send 55 of these students on an educational boat trip down the Mississippi to see eagles and other wildlife
- Adopted Aurora Academy in South Minneapolis. Fifth grade students have gone on bird walks and have benefited from presentations and Audubon Adventures. Binoculars have been donated from the Target Center lost and found, which are being distributed to these schools for students who have no access to them
- A total of ten presentations were made to various schools including slide shows of birds and field trips using binoculars
- Susan Tertell has also acted as field trip chair, organizing many trips for local members and friends. Check the website and each Kingfisher for upcoming events

We are always looking for other members to donate their time, talent, and enthusiasm for chapter activities. We need people to go into the schools and tell kids about birds. We need people for our publicity committee to help promote our programs, volunteer to help remove buckthorn or lead field trips or a host of needs in our community.

## ACM Drafts Agreement to Adopt Roberts Bird Sanctuary

Audubon Chapter of Minneapolis (ACM) has drafted an agreement with the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) to Adopt-a-Park (Roberts Bird Sanctuary). It is the hope of ACM to finalize this agreement so that we can help restore Roberts Bird Sanctuary.

The agreement will involve performing some mundane tasks such as picking up litter, but will also involve more interesting tasks, such as doing bird surveys. ACM also expects to begin holding regular bird walks, which will use the lists generated to make a Bird List for Roberts, which will be available to all visitors to Roberts. ACM would like to enlist a core of about ten volunteers (others will be recruited as needed) to do most of these tasks.

# May's Urban Birding Festival Is Bigger and Better than Ever!

Mark your calendars now for a fun, free celebration of springtime birds: the Urban Birding Festival, May 13-16, 2010. Kids, families, and everyone else is invited to take part in all or part of this four-day event, now in its fifth year. Billed as "Where birds and people meet," the festival welcomes everyone—from brand-new to experienced birders—to see many of the interesting birds found in the Twin Cities and suburbs. No registration is required, so just show up at the events you wish to attend.

The festival, with metro Audubon chapters key sponsors, features free daytime and evening bird walks, plus a day-long series of events at Fridley's Springbrook Nature Center, "Birding Central" for the festival. The only event requiring a reservation and a fee is Birding Central's catered lunch on May 15, featuring birder and conservationist Lyle Bradley speaking about bird habitats.

The festival wraps up on Sunday, May 16, with hikes through the rarely-open Arden Hills Army Training Site. All walks during the festival are led by experienced bird watchers, many of them Audubon members.

## CITIZEN ACTION



People of Minnesota live here largely because of the wealth of natural surroundings with which we are blessed. Most folks are willing to go out of their way to recycle, conserve energy, and purchase goods that are produced responsibly. But to do so they must have access to—and sort through—a large amount of information.

For example, in the 1890's, women's hats sporting plumages of birds, mostly from the Everglades, were all the rage. The Audubon Society raised the awareness of the public by reporting the moral dilemma raised by unsustainable animal harvesting. They even tried to get women to wear birdless hats called Audubonnets. This was only mildly successful, but laid the foundation for John F. Lacy, a legislator from Iowa, to formulate a bill: "The Lacy Bird and Game Act of 1900." This bill put an end to indiscriminate killing and put animals under greater federal protection.

Today, there are stores in some states that have eliminated the use of plastic bags. Even after 30+ years of recycling programs, plastic bags are rarely recycled. Instead, bags can become tiny particles that can act as a sponge for toxic chemicals, and can concentrate them one million times. These particles can kill many species of birds and fish.

There are five factories in India that make plastic bags. They use 17 million barrels of oil and large quantities of natural gas per year. One million bags are used per minute and four billion per year end up in a landfill or in the soil, lakes or oceans. The one trillion (doesn't seem like as big a number as it used to) bags used, last about 1,000 years in a landfill. Biodegradable bags don't help the situation much.

If you want to help reduce the use of plastic bags, you can take washable bags and reused bags to the store, but you don't have to stop there. You can tell store clerks and managers, or the company itself, that you prefer they take steps to reduce bag use.
