A Note from the President

Thank you, thank you, thank you!!! Your response to our Fall Appeal was overwhelming! The total received was \$1650, far beyond what we had expected. The largest amount received was \$50 and there were three anonymous \$1 amounts. We know you gave as much as you felt you could and again, we thank you.

Because we now have the funds, we need to identify teachers who want to use *Audubon Adventures* in their classroom. So if you are a teacher in our chapter area, ideally teaching grades 3 – 6 (grade 2 can work with help), contact either Trudi Poquette or myself so that we can get you set up.

We will also be looking for other opportunities to use the funds to aid in our mission of environmental education. If anyone has any ideas, don't hesitate to pass them along. It has been my desire to set up a program to provide a leader in the classroom who deals with birds. Now that we have some funds to aid us in doing it, we only need the volunteers willing to give the classroom presentations. So if you have had some classroom experience or are comfortable speaking in front of groups, give me a call so that we can begin this program.

Another project I have been trying to get off the ground is video-taping our programs and then providing them to cable TV stations to run on their public-access channel. Also, we have many shut-in members who would like to attend the programs but can't for various reasons. I would like to have the tapes available to them through the area libraries.

We now have some funds to possibly do this, but again we would need a volunteer who has some video-taping experience or is willing to learn on-the-job. I believe we can get the equipment and the necessary training from the cable TV operators, we only need someone willing to be trained and show up to do the taping with some follow-up editing of the tapes to fit the time format for the cable TV programs. Any volunteers?

These are a couple of my ideas for using the funds, but as I noted in an earlier column, the money is great, but volunteers still are much more important to our organization. We never lack for ways to spend it, but it often requires someone to volunteer to get the greatest value out of it.

SMALL, SUCCESSFUL CEDAR LAKE BLUEBIRDTRAIL UP FOR ADOPTION!

The amazingly successful bluebird trail on Cedar Lake Park property just west of downtown Minneapolis has been monitored regularly since 1987. Established by Mary McGee, the four pairs (8 total nest boxes) have been enjoyed by several monitors since, and observed by many along the walking/bike trails on the north end of the lake. This year, there were six bluebirds nests and thirteen youngsters fledged.

The current couple monitoring the trail did not want to give it up, but must travel abroad next year. Commitment is from April through August, once a week. The trail can be shared so several people could take turns checking.

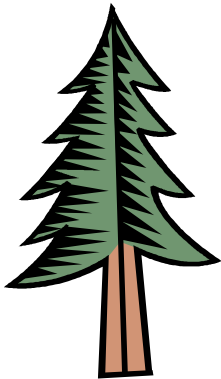

We learned of the recent death of Betty Hale, a long-time and very active member of the Minneapolis Bird Club which became the Minneapolis Audubon Chapter. She was an ardent birder on field trips, traveled with the summer trips, and was in charge of mailing the Kingfisher for many, many years. John Hale, who preceded his wife in death, was active in the chapter as well. John spent many years taking the Audubon story into Minneapolis classrooms.

Environmental Round-Up



A symposium on northern owls is planned for March 16-18 in Duluth. International speakers will be invited to this event hosted by Hawk Ridge Bird Observatory and the Natural Resources Institute, UMD. Focus of this symposium will be on the northern owl irruption and its causes.

In July, the Zumbro Valley Audubon Society held their 2005 butterfly count in Rochester. They found 31 species which equaled the previous high count, although the total numbers (495) were less than half of previous peaks. Forty-eight Milbert's tortoiseshells were found compared with only two in any other year. The temperature was 90+ and perhaps limited the counters' activity.

Minnesota River Valley AC has a full schedule of wildlife field trips planned for the year. Check the website www.mrvac.org for information and registration.

The Audubon Society of Greater Denver has scored a 100% success in the Colorado legislature. Every bill they worked to oppose died, and every bill they supported, won. It's encouraging to see environmental issues going forward in other places. Included was a bill to fund air and water quality as well as Colorado State Parks.

Voters across America last November overwhelmingly supported measures to protect parks and open spaces. Out of 161 funding measures, 121 were approved, creating \$3.25 billion for land conservation.

Although both Minnesota senators kept their vow to vote against it, the U.S. Senate passed an energy bill that opens Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR) to oil drilling. We hope when the House votes, it will act more responsibly.

Editor's follow-up: The planned November 10th House vote on the ANWR bill was delayed because of opposition to issues unrelated to the Arctic Refuge topic. Deep cuts in the budget-cutting package (to which the ANWR drilling provision was attached) angered House GOP moderates, forcing a temporary suspension of the matter. For the time being, the caribou and tundra are safe.



FIND A DATE FOR VALENTINE'S DAY AT SPEED-DATING IN THE PARK

Find a date who shares your passion for the Great Outdoors and a healthy active lifestyle at Three Rivers Park District's Valentine's Day "Speed-Dating in the Parks."

Two speed-dating sessions are available: Session 1 for ages 22-33 meets from 6-9 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 7, and Session 2 for ages 30-45 meets from 6-9 p.m. on Thursday, Feb. 9, at French Regional Park in Plymouth.

During Speed-Dating in the Parks, participants will snowshoe with their dates on a candlelit trail for five minutes, keeping track of their dates on a dating card. If dates share an interest in each other, they will receive each others' contact information so they can set up another date. The program concludes with hot chocolate and time for socializing.

The entry fee is \$20 and includes use of snowshoes. Participants should be prepared to hike if there is no snow. Reservations are required; call 763.559.6700. Reference Activity Number #125117-00 for the 22-33 year-old session and #125117-01 for the 30-45 year-old session.

French Regional Park is located at 12605 County Road 9 in Plymouth. From I-494, take County Road 9 (Rockford Road) east one mile to the park entrance. From Highway 169, take County Road 9 west two miles to the park entrance. Parking is free. French Regional Park is operated by Three Rivers Park District.

It Started with Goldfinches



A good place to watch birds may not be in some far-off natural area or in another country. It could be as close as your own backyard. In previous articles, I have talked about how Pamela and I started planting our yard with native species. Over time, we have noticed a change in the varieties of birds coming to the yard. Early on, it was mostly house sparrows and house finches. There were also the other

assorted common birds that came for the sunflower seeds and thistle seeds in the feeders.

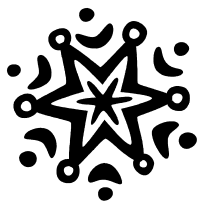
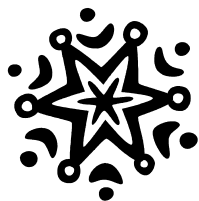
Last summer, we stopped filling the feeders to see what would happen. The birds still came. Goldfinches were often seen in the tall coneflowers, cup plants and some of the other seed producers. We learned to stand still when the coneflowers were moving on a windless day and look closely to find the finches eating the seeds. One day, we walked out of the house and saw a goldfinch hanging upside down on a toppled stalk. I managed to get one photo before it took off.

The lights went on: *the goldfinches are coming to the yard without having a feeder. They are coming for the native seed.* Our garden is becoming an oasis in a desert of urban/suburban lawns.

Will other birds start visiting? Even with the feeders removed, the birds are still coming to the yard. A catbird nested nearby this summer and was seen frequently in our lilac bush. A white-throated sparrow and chipping sparrow were seen in the yard. Could this be the start of a miniature bird sanctuary? It's very doubtful in a small city lot such as ours, but if more of the neighbors start adding native plants to their yards...Hmmm?

As I mentioned, it started with goldfinches.
