A Note from the President

At times I have heard the criticism that there are too many environmental organizations, resulting in inefficiencies. The more I learn of their individual missions, the more convinced I become that this criticism is ill-founded. Each organization has adapted to needs and identified its niche, much as the organisms it has determined to preserve have done. Some agencies have evolved to focus on land acquisition, such as the Nature Conservancy. Some have focused on policy changes, from local to international, such as the Natural Resources Defense Council or Forest Service Employees for Environmental Ethics. The Defenders of Wildlife and The World Wildlife Fund concentrate on wildlife habitat throughout the world. Some groups have zeroed in on the legal machinery, taking on everything from companies to the U.S. government.

There is, of course, some necessary overlap, and where this occurs the groups usually try to speak with one voice and clarity of purpose. When I hear individuals speak of "environmentalists" as though they disagree with them categorically, does that mean that they don't care about the environment? Organizations run the gamut from grassroots foundation-building to the high-profile, confrontational approach more common in the '70's. But whatever the individual concern, there is an organization that fits. My suggestion: educate yourself about the issues, get on board, and give it one's time and monetary support.

The intriguing thing to me is that despite the downturn in the economy, most environmental agencies have been able to count on their support base and have maintained most of their programs. Committed Americans speak with their wallets, which I believe gives credence to environmental education programs of all types. The National Audubon Society, along with other groups, has emphasized education and has produced some excellent materials. *Audubon* magazine is highly informative, and includes research and perspectives from top writers. *Audubon Adventures* is a set of materials about birds and other wildlife for grades 4-6 classrooms. In recent years, Audubon Chapter of Minneapolis has provided free materials and field trips to some 30+ area schools.

Another example of the importance of education is the success of the Congo Basin Forest Partnership. Agencies from the U.S. and Europe have joined to conserve 126 million acres in the Congo Basin, more than 1/3 of their forests. 11-1/2 million acres are now sustainably harvested, and 5,000 local men and women have received conservation training.

A Birder's Guide to Minnesota

Kim Eckert, with over 45 years of birding experience throughout the U.S. and Canada, has been guiding birders or teaching bird identification classes for more than 30 of those years. Since the 1980s, he has led tours to places like Newfoundland, Churchill, California, Arizona, Florida, locations in the Great Lakes and Great Plains, and to Texas – a favorite and frequent winter destination. He has authored four editions of *A Birder's Guide to Minnesota*, and he has written numerous articles, notes, and seasonal reports for the Minnesota Ornithologists' Union journal *The Loon* and other publications, such as *Birding* and *North American Birds*. He also operates the Minnesota Birding Weekends program of birding tours (now in its 25th year), has been a member for three decades of Minnesota's Records Committee, and for 20 years he served as Naturalist at Hawk Ridge Nature Reserve in Duluth. A Minnesota resident since attending St. John's University in the 1960s, he has resided in Duluth since 1977.

Kim will provide a general overview of the best birding sites in the state, along with the sought-after species that Minnesota is renowned for.

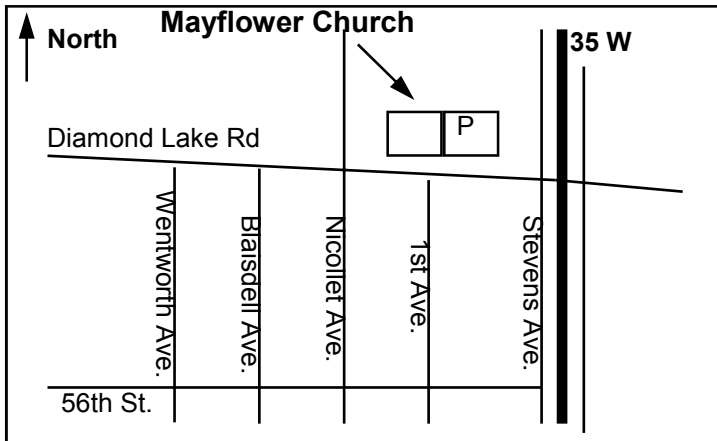

Learning to Lead Birders Workshop

This **Field Trip Leader Training Workshop** is one way for twin cities birding organizations to help leaders; birding expertise is not a requirement. The goal is to increase the number of birders willing to explore becoming club leaders.

DATE: Saturday April 17, 2010 from 2 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. If this date is impossible for you, please let Chase know so an additional workshop can be considered.

PLACE: The Bass Ponds, a great birding spot tucked on the Minnesota River below and behind the MOA. The diversity of landscape edges offer a great training place for most of the challenges encountered on group field trips.

DIRECTIONS: take Cedar Avenue/Hwy 77 to Old Shakopee Road just south of I-494, exit and follow Old Shakopee northeast and around the curve where it turns into 24th Avenue. Continue on 24th to the traffic light at 86th Street, turn east (right) toward the river bluff and bear left into the Bass Ponds parking area.

HANDOUTS are an important part of this workshop so it would help, but is not required, if you RSVP'd. Bring binoculars, your favorite pocket bird guide, and a notepad and pencil if that is your style. Consider bringing a friend. Dress for the weather and consider a snack or drink in your pocket.
