A Note from the President

With some joy and sorrow, I write my last column. It has been an exciting time, with some accomplishments and some things yet to do.

With your help last fall we were able to give the chapter some financial breathing room to do some of the things we have wanted to do for some time. We have restructured our cash flow so that we feel we have optimized our income from it while it waits to be used. We have had excellent programs during the past two years. We have attended many community and education events promoting environmental issues, National Audubon and our chapter. We have nominated three areas within our chapter area as IBA's. We have been a presence at the Capitol, participating in Lobby Day as well as attending many legislative hearings. We also have arranged to have some programs over the summer, partnering with the Isaak Walton League – Breckenridge Chapter. This will accomplish a couple of my goals - to provide some activity during the summer and to have events in the northern part of our chapter area. See the article about these coming programs.

The things I wasn't able to do, I will try to accomplish as the Past-President in the next year. I am still interested in recording our programs for later viewing on cable TV and providing them to groups who can not attend the meetings such as assisted living homes. I would like to establish a vital active Conservation Committee, which I hope to chair initially. I hope to continue our Buckthorn Wars theme. I would also like to see an active Education Committee that will provide in-class programs for schools and/or a partnering with MOU to do their birding program in schools. I would like to see at least 15 schools in our chapter area being provided *Audubon Adventures*.

My hope for the future is to activate a volunteer base that becomes interested in doing many jobs like being the State Fair Chair, Education Chair, Membership Chair and Program Chair. These are vital jobs that make the chapter function. Remember my mantra – **Ask to Help!**

This past year the Bluebird Recovery Program has undergone a leadership transition. I would like to thank Dorene Scriven for her many years of chairing it. Under her leadership the BBRP has grown tremendously and probably more importantly have helped fledge thousands of young bluebirds for us all to enjoy.

SUSTAINABLE FORESTRY

Twenty years ago a U S based organization, the Institute for Agriculture and Trade Policy (IATP), was established in Minnesota to work with farm leaders and trade experts Their mission--to determine how international trade institutions would impact farmers and rural communities and to challenge global institutions to develop solutions to problems plaguing rural communities and food systems around the world.

Our speaker, Don Arnosti, is the Director of IATP's program, the Community Forestry Resource Center (CGRC). His work is promoting responsible forest management by encouraging the long-term health of small privately owned woodlots, their owners and their communities.

Don will bring us up to date on the state of Minnesota's private forests, bird-friendly forestry, the expansion of the biomass energy market, woodland invasive species and more. We will learn how our forests can earn certification by the Forest Stewardship Council (FSC).

Don served for 10 years as Director of the Audubon MN State Office. He is currently serving on the Board of Directors of both Audubon MN and the Audubon Center of the North Woods. Don and his family live in St. Paul.

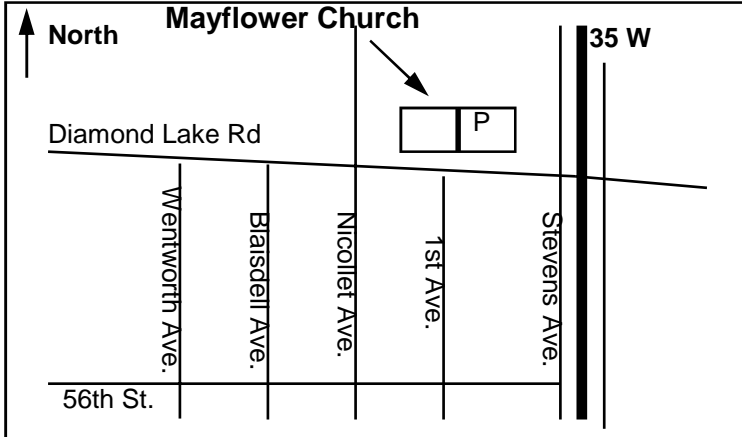

Turkeys Killed at Coon Rapids School

About a half dozen wild turkeys were killed by sharpshooters at the L. O. Jacobs School in Coon Rapids this winter. The turkeys had taken up residence in the area, probably attracted by the many large oak trees in the area. Unfortunately some area residents began feeding them. They probably made the connection between people and food. Because they are large, many students were afraid of them. The turkeys became somewhat aggressive and chased some students, probably looking for food. It was even reported that a group of students had to be rescued by an adult near the school. After consulting with the Minnesota DNR and the National Wild Turkey Federation, it was decided to destroy them. Six were shot. Two survive.

Comment on Turkeys at School

The above story is at first glance somewhat amusing, unless you're the turkey. However, if we look at it more in depth we can see a problem that we as environmentalists need to address. We very much value the flora and fauna around us and lament when they are destroyed and disappear from our environment. It is my position that they have a rightful spot in our environment and we must make allowances for them. We must remember they are wild (and free) creatures and we must respect them. Trying to bring them into our sphere and expect them to adhere to our notion of behavior is wrong. And when they do not, we destroy them. This is not the message we should be giving. The general public and especially our children need to understand nature and how to deal with the problems associated with our interaction with it. Large animals, like turkeys, can be intimidating. But do we have to kill them the first time there is a problem? Is this sending the right message to our children? Can't we try other remedies first? Are we using this incident as a learning tool? Will we have to repeat this next winter? These are questions that need to be addressed. The incident at L. O. Jacobs School was resolved in what was probably the correct manner, but the above questions need to be answered and appropriate action taken to insure the problem isn't repeated there again or at a school in White Bear Lake!

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I would also like to thank Fran Duritsa for her tenure as the Program Chair. Because of her hard work and dedication we have had the privilege to attend many excellent programs.

A final thanks to the Board for their outstanding support and advice.
