Letter from the President

Hi Everyone,

Here's hoping that you are having a great summer! The chapter's Board of Directors has had a three-month hiatus. At the last meeting we discussed ways in which the chapter can contribute financially to other causes. Many groups approach our chapter for donations and although we would like to give something to everyone, that is not possible. So, as in most organizations, a committee was formed to discuss the matter and report their recommendations to the Board for a vote. A large portion of this donated money comes from members. We provide scholarships for kids to attend ecology camps, Audubon Adventures for 26 elementary classrooms within our chapter area, and support for the Minnesota State Audubon office. Our main, actually only, fundraiser is the spring Big Day/Bird Census. Our thanks to the folks that contributed this year, totaling approximately \$300. This amount is about half of that taken in last year and may not allow us to provide our usual financial support (in fact it barely covered the cost of printing the donation envelopes). If you have any fundraising ideas, please "donate" your time to help the Board increase your chapter's support of some worthy causes.

In the same light, the Board of Directors still has openings for two members. We have nine monthly meetings, each of which lasts about two hours. If you are interested, please give me a call. As always, all members are welcome to attend any Board meeting. Most Board meetings are held at Anwatin Middle School.

September 7: Valley of Grass: Prairie and Parkland of the Red River Region

Mary Ziegenhagen's work in prairie preservation found expression in 1980 when she learned of 30 acres that had been identified within the city limits of Savage following a grass fire. She supported designation of what is now the Black Dog Fen and Prairie Complex, a scientific and natural area of the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources.

Mary has served as an editorial writer for the *Star Tribune*, for the McKnight Foundation, the Minnesota Historical Society, and the Minnesota Department of Human Services. She currently edits five weekly newspapers in the western Twin Cities area. She completed Peace Corps service in the Philippines and in Western Samoa. Her international travel has included two 150-mile treks in the Himalayas of Nepal.

She recently coauthored *Valley of Grass*, sponsored by the Minnesota chapter of The Nature Conservancy.

An Opportunity to Sail on the Birding Boat

Would you enjoy a leisurely Saturday afternoon paddleboat trip on the Mississippi River with an opportunity to learn about the birds and history along the river? Here's your chance. The Minnesota Audubon Council has been cooperating with the Mississippi National River and Recreation Area and the Padelford Packet Company to bring "Birding Boat" adventures to children for the last three months. The "Birding Boat" is the inspiration of Charlie Maguire, the "Singing Ranger" of the Mississippi River. Charlie, Audubon volunteers, National Park Service rangers and a bird artist, and Minnesota Historical Society staff will entertain you with songs about the river, help you see the birds, coordinate art activities, and provide information about the river and its history.

Now, these "Birding Boat" partners are offering an opportunity to the public on Saturday afternoons at 2:00 p.m. on Sept. 18 from Harriet Island in Saint Paul or Sept. 25 from Boom Island dock in Minneapolis. Anyone booking passage on the trip can participate in this special "Birding Boat" program. It's a great event for families with a free Birding Boat Guide and extra binoculars available.

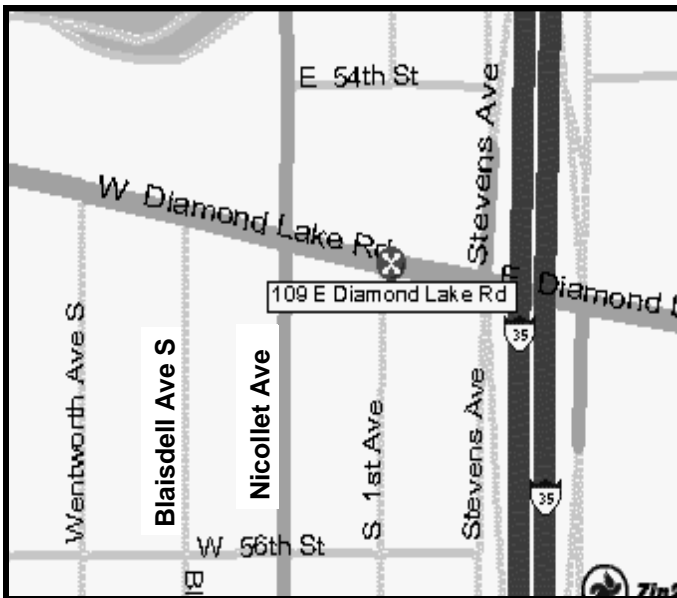

Audubon Ark to Highlight All-Audubon Picnic

Music, games, and a live bald eagle will be among the activities beginning at noon on Saturday, August 21st when the National Audubon Society's "Audubon Ark" docks at Hidden Falls Park in St. Paul. Bring your picnic goodies and enjoy music from Charlie Maguire, Bill Hinkley, and Judy Larson, and a brief program to honor recent conservation achievements along both the Mississippi and Minnesota river valleys. Games for kids, exhibits, and free refreshments will be provided by Minnesota Audubon and local Audubon chapters. Staff from the Audubon Center of the North Woods will be giving eagle presentations during the event, which starts at 10 a.m. and ends at 2 p.m.

This is a great opportunity to enjoy a day on the river, meet Audubon folks from other chapters, swap bird stories, and have fun! If helping with games for kids or handing out free lemonade and watermelon would add to your fun, please call the Minnesota Audubon office.

Hidden Falls Park is just one of the 37 stops that the Ark, a 48-foot houseboat, will make on its month-long Mississippi River inspection and education journey. Community members at each stop are invited to visit the Ark, enjoy exhibits and music about the river, learn about the ecology of the river, and share their hopes and concerns for the river's future.

Information gathered during the tour will be combined with comments collected at public workshops this spring to complete the report, "A River that Works and a Working River," to be released in December 1999. The riverboat trip will also be the subject of a Travel Channel "American Journey" documentary, to be broadcast early next year.

The Audubon stage and boat launch can be reached from the north entrance of Hidden Falls Park on Mississippi River Boulevard at Magoffin Avenue. Along with the Audubon activities at the park, the Friends of the Mississippi River (FMR) will be conducting the Watershed 100, their annual event to have 100 volunteers paint signage on storm drains that conduct water into the river. The activities begin at 10 a.m. and will continue through 2 p.m. at the park pavilion.

Free Audubon Adventures Workshops for Teachers

Do you teach a 3rd-6th grade class or know someone who does? If so, the Metro area Audubon chapters invite you to a free Saturday morning workshop on using Audubon Adventures, National Audubon Society's exciting classroom nature program for children.

Geared to grades 3-6, the Audubon Adventures curriculum features four editions of Audubon's innovative newspaper for kids, an educational videotape from the Audubon Animal Adventures series, and a classroom resource guide filled with hands-on activities, duplicating masters, and research material. Audubon Adventures activities can also be integrated with Audubon's internet based citizen-science programs such as WatchList for Kids and the Great Backyard Bird Count. Topics for the 1999-2000 school year are "Forests," "People and Wildlife Sharing the Earth," "Fins, Fur and Feathers (Alaska)," "Our One and Only Everglades," and the video "Eagles." The program is multidisciplinary and designed to be integrated into the existing classroom curriculum.

Teachers who attend the workshop will also have the opportunity to meet local Audubon volunteers who are available to make presentations and lead field trips for classrooms. The half-day workshop is offered September 18 and September 25 (please register for only one date). It will take place at the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge headquarters near the metropolitan airport. The workshop is from 9:00 a.m. -12:00 noon, and is free to 3-6th grade teachers. Enrollment is limited. Call Suzanne Plass at 651-225-1830 for more information or to register for the workshop.

Oct. 5 "Through the Eyes of a Raven" Kristin Stuchis is a graduate of the Wolf Ridge Program and is continuing her studies for a Master's of Education at the University of Minnesota at Duluth. She will present a slide program on these enchanting birds.

Nov. 9 "The Birds of the North Coast of Alaska" Christine Turnbull is the executive director of the Hunt Hill Audubon Sanctuary. She will present a slide program on this remote bird haven.

Dec. 7 "Wood Ducks of Kandiyohi County" Dr. Roger Strand will follow the story of the Wood Ducks of Kandiyohi County with a video that details their lives from egg-laying to duckling jumping, including mixed breeding of Wood Ducks and Hooded Mergansers.

You! Yes YOU! You are the one who decides which issues your state Audubon office will work on/lend our name in support of or oppose during the upcoming legislative session. Any chapter member may nominate an issue. Forms for "Requests for Issues" will be mailed to Conservation Chairs, Presidents, and any member requesting an issue nomination form. Issues nominated in past years have ranged from BWCAW management to funding for preservation of metropolitan greenways. Last year the legislative work of the Minnesota Audubon Council and chapter members increased funding for nongame wildlife programs by \$235,000 for the next two years!
