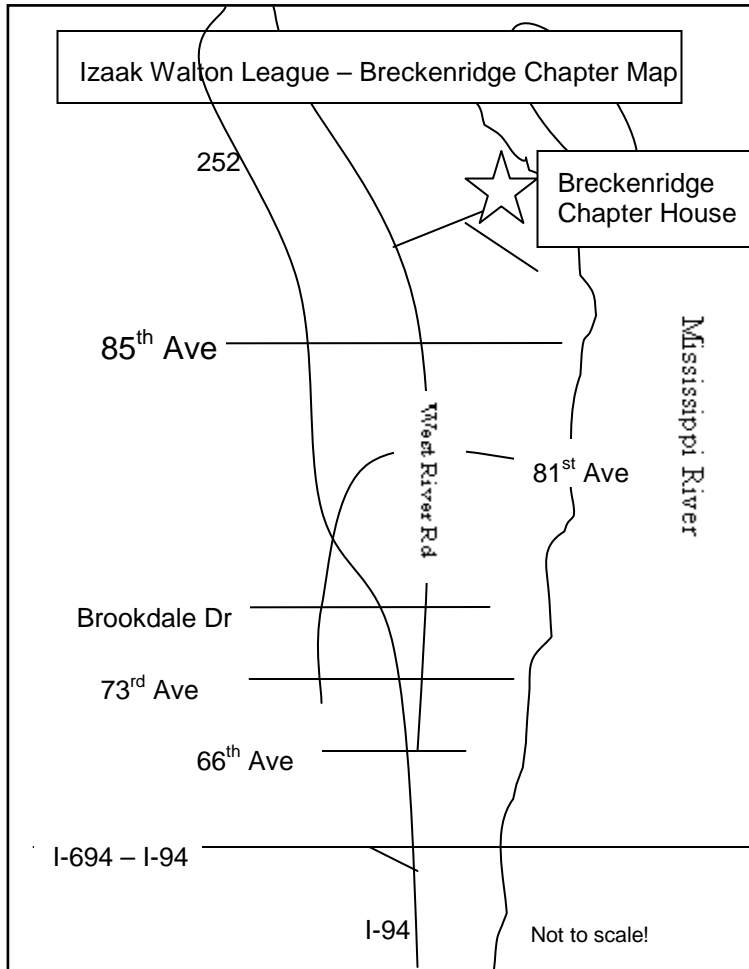
August Program

RIVER FISH IN METRO AREA

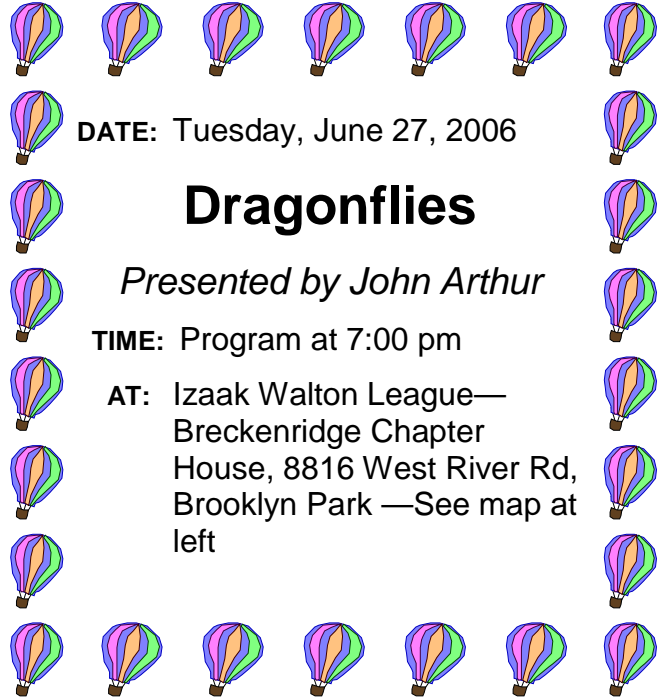

Audubon's 2006 Minnesota Legislative Priorities Summary

It was as fast and furious session with some losses and some victories. Legislators were eager to end the session and get their campaigns kicked-off for the fall elections. Make sure you contact me if you're going to be meeting or see your legislator this summer or attend a debate forum in the fall. I can supply you with voting records and information on our issues to share with each candidate.

Bonding

As many of you know, the State issues state general obligation bonds to leverage funds for capital improvements every two years. Audubon supported bonding for the following programs, all of which help to protect and restore critical and sensitive bird and other wildlife habitat. The Governor proposed an \$845 million bonding bill to the legislature. The House's final bonding bill added an extra \$100 million (\$949 million) while the Senate's bill was at \$989 million. The bonding conference committee agreed to a final package of \$948 million – with many of the Senate's grants to localities being tossed-out. Nevertheless, a billion dollar bonding bill is nearly record-high and the environment fared pretty well.

7TH ANNUAL GREAT MN RIVER BIRDING DAY

The 7th annual Great MN River Birding Day will be held on Saturday, September 16, 2006. Birders will be encouraged to explore birding sites in the MN River Valley from Ft. Snelling in the east to Big Stone Lake in the west and from Walnut Lake in Faribault County to Inspiration Point in Otter Tail County. This year birders will be allowed to bird areas of the watershed that are west of Hwy 15 which runs from St. Cloud through Hutchinson, New Ulm and Fairmont to the Iowa border on Friday, September 15th as well as on Saturday, September 16th. There will be 3 rallies that birders can attend. The first will be Friday evening from 4:30-6:30 at the Lac Qui Parle WMA Headquarters just NW of Watson off of US 59/Hwy 7 in Chippewa County. There will be a light dinner served at around 5PM. On Saturday there will be a rally in Mankato at Rasmussen Nature Center from 2-4PM and a rally at the MN River Valley NWR Headquarters in Bloomington from 1-3PM. There will be refreshments at both rallies. Last year we had over 100 participants who identified 181 species. This will be difficult to beat, but if enough of us get out there and the weather cooperates, we have a chance. Wetlands Summit Report – 2006

Last March 31st, over 300 people interested in the preservation and restoration of wetlands met and reviewed the problems and brainstormed future action. Below is the executive summary of that Summit.

Executive Summary

The first Minnesota Wetlands Summit was developed to recognize the values of the state's vast network of historical wetlands, to review current losses and gains, and to identify corrective measures needed. The opening session examined the history and status of wetland policies, programs, regulations and current problems. Three concurrent sessions addressed: (1) The conservation features of the Federal Farm Program and related problems. (2) The role of private landowners in improving water quality, providing fish and wildlife habitat and related recreational activities. (3) Performance of the Minnesota Wetlands Conservation Act. During the closing plenary session principle issues were identified and recommendations for action were determined by consensus. In the authors' opinion, the six most significant recommendations are:

- Conduct a strong grassroots effort to retain wetland and grassland conservation practices in the 2007 Farm Bill, and seek a better balance between payments for conservation practices and commodity practices.
 - Enforce current wetlands protection laws and strengthen where needed.
 - Develop a more effective education program to inform the public about the importance of private lands and the Farm Bill in maintaining wetlands, grasslands, other fish and wildlife habitats, related recreational activities, and improving water quality.
 - Reassess the performance of the Wetlands Conservation Act and take corrective action to establish firm criteria for granting exemptions, retaining wetlands functions and values when considering wetland replacement, providing greater protection for temporary and seasonal wetlands, and strengthening enforcement capabilities.
 - Improve monitoring and evaluation techniques to measure more accurately annual wetland losses and gains.
 - Support legislation for long-term dedicated funding for natural resource programs and for LCMR reform.
- Additional issues, related recommendations and conclusions are included in the Position Paper section of the Report. More detailed individual session summaries of discussion and other comments by attendees are included in the Appendices to this Report.

Veracruz River of Raptors

September 24 - October 2, 2006
with tour leaders **Amber Burnette and Sharon Stiteler**

Central Veracruz is the main flyway in the world for raptor migration. Every year an average of five million raptors are registered by Pronatura Veracruz, one of six groups whose mission is the conservation of flora, fauna, and priority ecosystems in Mexico.

Geography probably accounts for the funneling of 3.3 million raptors through Veracruz each year. Most of the raptors are soaring birds; so they depend on thermals to obtain altitude. Since the open sea does not have thermals, the birds are restricted to the Mexican peninsula as they fly between North America and points south. However, good thermals are not to be found in the mountains, which occupy much of Mexico west of Veracruz; so they must stay near the coast. As a result virtually the entire population of some raptors is flying through a strip of land just 25 miles wide.

This tour will have two base locations - Cardel and Xalapa. **TRIP COSTS: \$2495/person double occupancy.**

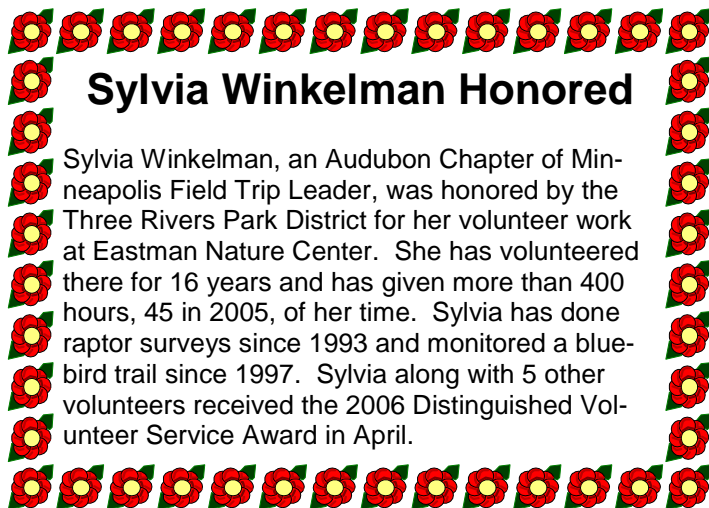
